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Reception Rabbits & Robins

We have started our new topic about traditional tales and we have started with Jack and the Beanstalk. We will be learning about what plants need to grow. Both classes have been busy making their own beanstalks, as well as sorting different types of beans and counting beans into numbered pots. In English we are slightly behind the new topic and have just finished off 'All aboard the London Bus'. See if your child can tell you the 5 places that we visited when they show you their bus ticket! In Maths we have been learning about length and height. Phonics this week has been focusing on some of the phase 3 digraphs that we learnt last term (see parent sheet for this week) and reading words with these digraphs in. Please do keep practising the digraphs and tricky words. In handwriting we have learnt how to form *m n r* correctly - no 'cheating' letters please!



Year 1 Otters & Seals

It has been lovely to welcome the children back and to start some new learning topics this week. In Maths we are looking at place value with numbers to 50, exploring the tens and ones a little more. We have focused on our SPAG skills in English, thinking about tricky word spelling and making words plural by adding *s* or *es*. We have made the most of some warmer weather in our outside space, making number lines and dens to role play being explorers in. We have started to look at common plants in science and are excited about doing some planting next week. Finally, we have been working hard on our singing parts for the upcoming KS1 show!



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
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Year 2 Badgers & Foxes

We have made a fantastic start to some exciting new topics! In English, we have begun our new unit based on *The Crow's Tale* by Naomi Howarth. This beautifully illustrated story has captured the children's imaginations with its rich language and magical storytelling. We have been exploring the themes of kindness, consequence and transformation, while developing our descriptive writing skills.

In Maths, we have continued developing our understanding of multiplication and division. We have been using practical resources, number lines and problem-solving activities to deepen understanding and build fluency. It has been wonderful to see the children's confidence growing as they recognise patterns in number facts. In Art, we explored the technique of using carbon paper to create prints. The children carefully traced their designs to produce detailed printed images and then enhanced their work by adding intricate patterns and fine details. They experimented with line, shape and texture to make each piece unique. Well done to everyone for their continued enthusiasm and hard work! We look forward to another exciting half term of learning ahead.



Year 3 Dragonflies & Bumblebees

This week in Year 3 we have been busy learning all about fractions. We have explored what a numerator and denominator are and how they help us understand how many parts make up a whole. We looked at both unit fractions and non-unit fractions and practised finding fractions of different shapes and quantities. In English, we had great fun acting in role as news reporters, eye witnesses, police officers and curators as we tried to decide what happened to the missing Roman artefact, ready to write our news reports next week. In Art, we have been exploring Gaudi and the wonderful architecture he created. We also enjoyed a gallery walk of our impressive home learning projects. Thank you for supporting the children with such great work for their home learning.

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
Year 4 Eagles & Owls

It has been a super first week back for Year 4! In Mathematics we have started our new unit of fractions, we have begun by recapping last years work and progressing on to fractions beyond 1. In English we have been writing a story together about a girl with a magical crayon, ready to plan our own story next week. In Art we tested out and drew some poses that our Viking sculptures might have at the end of our unit. And in Science we began looking at living things and their habitats, focusing in on the different features animals have and how we can classify them. We hope you received your letter about our school trip to the UEA, please make sure you have completed and provided consent by next Friday.



Year 5 Kings, Emperors & Royals

It has been a great start back for year 5. We have fully immersed ourselves into Spring term 2 and our learning! In History we have started our topic of the Mayans- learning about Central America and the countries situated in this area. In Science we have completed a drop test to understand the effects of gravity! We really enjoyed looking at our key skills of comparative and fair testing. In English we have begun our Independent write creating our poem inspired by the Malfeasance. We are ready for next week- bring on World Book Day!



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Year 6 Lions & Jaguars

We have had a really busy first week back in Year 6, starting the Spring 2 term off by introducing our new units in each subject! The children have fully immersed themselves in our Industrial Revolution and Victorians learning so far, including starting our Charles Dickens reading, investigating the difference between Victorian toys and toys today in DT. In History, we used freeze-frame drama to show what life would have been like for the average person in this time. In English, we have been inspired by the book Cogheart to start our own Victorian inspired adventure story about a rebellious character who doesn't fit in to her strict regime at finishing school! We have loved getting into character balancing a book on our head to see what 'posture' lessons would be like!

YouTube Safety Update: New Parental Controls

YouTube have published their latest update on how parents can support their child on YouTube. YouTube will now allow parents to set the amount of time viewing Shorts – this can even be set to zero. YouTube Shorts are short videos, usually less than 60 seconds long, which when continuously watched, can lead to excessive screentime. Furthermore, parents will also be able to set bedtime and ‘take a break’ reminders. You can find out more here:

Mobile phones: do you know the risks?

We know that children having access to a smartphone can expose children to risks including:

- Viewing inappropriate content
- Excessive screen time/use, which in turn can affect their mental health and sleep pattern.
- Contact from inappropriate people/grooming
- Cyberbullying
- Spending money on in-app purchases/scams

What effects do mobile phones have on children’s mental health?

EE Online Safety Hub

EE has published age guidance for smartphone usage to improve children’s digital wellbeing. In summary, they recommend that children under 11 should use non-smart devices, for children aged 11-13, they advise that if a smartphone is used, then parental controls should be enabled and access to social media restricted. Finally, for 13-16-year-olds they still recommend that parental controls are implemented and appropriate restrictions set up. You can read the full guidance here:

Virtual Private Networks

A Virtual Private Network (VPN) helps make your connection between a device and the internet more secure and can help protect personal information and add privacy. However, whilst a VPN has benefits, it is important that you are aware that if your child is using a VPN, they may be able to get round Wi-Fi restrictions, access blocked or restricted websites and bypass parental controls. It may also mean that their browsing history is hidden.

Social Media Algorithms

What is an Algorithm?

Algorithms influence what we see on social media platforms and predict what type of content we are most likely to interact with, thereby keeping us online for longer. The algorithm uses information such as who you follow, what you have searched for and what you have watched, liked or shared to determine what it thinks most interests you. It will then show you this content more, for example, in the explore tab on Instagram.



What do I need to know?

Whilst there are benefits to algorithms, for example it means we tend to see content that does interest us, unfortunately there are negatives as well. They can lead to increased screentime as we continue to see things that interest us. Secondly, it can lead to users being shown large amounts of inappropriate content which can for example, exacerbate negative body image or heighten access to misogyny content. It can also lead to 'echo chambers' where you are only seeing content that relates to your opinion rather than seeing a balanced viewpoint.


