This template can be used for multiple purposes:

• It enables schools to effectively plan their use of the Primary PE and sport premium

It helps schools to meet the requirements (as set out in guidance) to publish information on their Primary PE and sport premium

It will be an effective document to support Ofsted inspections enabling schools to evidence progress in Physical Education (PE) and evidence swimming attainment, which forms part of the PE National Curriculum. We would recommend schools consider. the Intent, Implementation and Impact of any spend, as examined within the Education Inspection Framework.

It is important that your grant is used effectively and based on school need.

Schools must use the funding to make additional and sustainable improvements to the quality of the PE, School Sport and Physical Activity (PESSPA)

they offer. This means that you should use the Primary PE and sport premium to:

- Build capacity and capability within the school to ensure that improvements made now will benefit pupils joining the school in future years
- Develop or add to the PESSPA activities that your school already offers.

The Primary PE and sport premium should not be used to fund capital spend projects; the school's core budget should fund these. Further detail on capital expenditure can be found in the updated Primary PE and sport premium guidance.

The Primary PE and sport premium guidance, outlines 5 key priorities that funding should be used towards. It is not necessary that spending has to meet all the key priorities, you should select the priorities that you aim to use any funding towards.

Although completing this template is not a requirement for schools, schools are required to publish details of how they spend this funding. Schools must also outline what the impact this funding has had on pupils' PE and sport participation and attainment and how any spending will be sustainable in the future. **All funding must be spent by 31st July 2024.**

Swimming Data

Meeting National Curriculum requirements for swimming and water safety.

Priority should always be given to ensuring that pupils can perform safe self-rescue even if they do not fully meet the first two requirements of the National Curriculum programme of study

Question	Stats:	Further context Relative to local challenges
What percentage of your current Year 6 cohort can swim competently, confidently and proficiently over a distance of at least 25 metres?	69%	69% during the assessment day we had multiple pupils sat out on the side, therefore these have not completed their 25 meters and potentially effected the results.
What percentage of your current Year 6 cohort can use a range of strokes effectively [for example, front crawl, backstroke, and breaststroke]?	67%	67% Due to SATs, trips and facilities the pupils have only had 8/9 lessons, therefore even though we have been through each of the strokes, they haven't had a lot of practice to gain confidence and technique.

What percentage of your current Year 6 cohort are able to perform safe self-rescue in different water-based situations?	82%	As a group we completed a water safety level 1 exam where all but a few completed it. We also during the assessment day tested to see if pupils could float and tread water for a certain amount of time.

Have you provided CPD to improve the knowledge and confidence of staff to be able to teach swimming and water safety?	No	Our PE teacher is from Wymondham College, teaching swimming to Year 7 – Year 13 pupils. They are provided training at a secondary level.
